Information from the NHS

NHS Pharmacy First Service

Did you know that the NHS Pharmacy First Service enables children and adults to get convenient access to healthcare advice and treatment where appropriate, for seven common conditions without the potential delay of having to wait for a GP appointment? Accessing the service may mean that can help children feel better and back to school as quickly as possible, as well as supporting parents/carers to also get better if they are unwell with one of the conditions covered under the service.

There is no need to make an appointment; parents or carers can pop into their local Boots pharmacy with their child and ask for help under the service.

Support for the following conditions can be accessed under the service, free of charge (unless NHS prescription charges apply):

Common condition	Patient eligibility
Earache	1 to 17 years
Impetigo	1 year and over
Infected insect bites and stings	1 year and over
Sore throats	5 years and over
Sinusitis	12 years and over
Uncomplicated urinary tract	Women 16 to 64 years
Shingles	18 years and over

Thanks for the responses to the parent survey last half term. They will be very helpful in celebrating what we are doing well and identifying what we could do to improve the school. Of the respondents, 90% felt that this was a good school and areas such as the caring nature of staff and the positive relationships and environment in the school were mentioned by a number of parents. The vast majority of respondents also felt their child made good progress at school, the children had a range of learning opportunities, and that any concerns they did have were dealt with properly.

Moving forwards, a number of parents commented on the limited range of extra-curricular clubs after school. This is an area we are looking to develop and we have 2 new clubs starting this term to try and expand the range of opportunities for children. In the coming year, we will find out from parents more about what they would like to see with regards to after-school clubs so we can continue to develop this offer.
